#### **Classroom Expectations**

  passes. No students will leave the classroom without permission.
- Students' projects will never contain inappropriate material and always strive for a G rating. (<a href="www.mpaa.org">www.mpaa.org</a>).
- Students are expected to finish their filming during the assigned time frames. If you do not film your content during that time then you may be required to stay after school or complete it during lunch.
- Work as a collaborative team and split the work evenly.
- Complete work and assignments on time.
- If you experience technical difficulties, please contact a teacher. If I am not available in the classroom then email me ASAP with your question. Do not resume the work until you have received an answer from me.
- The studio will only be available during certain times for filming. Only one group is allowed to film in the studio. Students will be given only 15-20 minutes to film in the studio for each class period. If you are using the studio to film, you should not touch any of Advanaced TV equipment/set design/props. If anything is misplaced or rearranged you will no longer have access to the studio.
- Keep your hands and all objects to yourself. Horse playing will not be tolerated in class.
- Treat others with respect and do not tease or make fun of ideas and mistakes. I respect you, please respect me and your classmates.
- Be creative and have fun!

\*Three Strike Rule - If I need to speak to you more than three times you will either lose points or a teacher detention (depending on the severity).

#### Students will....

- 1. Be introduced to the classroom set up and safety regulations within the studio and classroom.
- 2. Learn how to properly set up and break down equipment.
- 3. Review their prior knowledge on camera operations and video editing.
- 4. Learn how to *film with intention* by using camera operations to encourage storytelling.
- 5. Enhance their video editing skills by using resources that create graphics along with special FX provided by Final Cut Pro.
- 6. Students will create a sequence composed of different camera shots and angles, and then progress to creating a small sequence utilizing continuity.

## Make-up Work as per Student Handbook

- Students who are absent from class for any reason will be required to make-up the work missed in each class. Completion of this work should take approximately the same amount of time as the student missed from class. In extreme cases of prolonged absence, (more than five consecutive days,) the Principal may grant extra time for the students to complete missing assignments. Students will receive an incomplete grade pending the submission of the missing assignments. Students will receive a zero for any work that is not completed by the designated timeline.

#### **Plagiarism Policy**

- **Freshmen**: On the first offense, the student may rewrite for a maximum grade of 55. The rewrite should be closely monitored by the teacher because on the freshmen level we are concerned with students' understanding of the process. On the second offense, the student receives a 0 grade for the final product. (Students' offenses will be filed in the supervisor's office.)
- **Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors:** If the teacher finds that the plagiarism is flagrant or pervasive and can document the same, the assessment may receive a grade of zero.

#### **Cheating**

Students are expected to conduct themselves honestly and with integrity in their work. All forms of cheating and plagiarism are prohibited. Unacceptable behavior includes, but is not limited to the following:

- Copying another student's work;
- Working with others on projects that are meant to be done individually;
- Looking at or copying another student's test or quiz answers;

- Taking papers from other students, publications, or internet sources and claiming it as one's own work;
- Academic dishonesty in any other form including, but not limited to, tampering with computerized grade records;
- Giving or receiving answers and/or test questions to or from another student.

Violators of this policy will be disciplined on a case-by-case basis, depending on the seriousness of the violation, prior violations and other factors.

Disciplinary measures/consequences may include, but are not limited to the following:

• Redoing the assignment (see policy on plagiarism);

- Receiving a zero grade on the project, test or quiz;
- Letter sent to parent and placed in the student's file;
- Detention, suspension or expulsion.
